The Sidney Woman's Club is one of the most influential groups in Sidney's history. Formed in 1913, club members led and organized numerous community projects, including school hot lunch programs, local cemetery benefits, cancer education programs, blood drives, tuberculosis seal sales, and other health and education programs.

The Woman's Club also developed Sidney's first library. It first grew out of a study group and members operated it out of the basement of the Yellowstone Mercantile building on Central Avenue starting in 1914. They volunteered their time to staff the library and stocked it with donated books from the community.

As the popularity of the library grew, the Woman's Club recognized the need for more resources to meet the community's needs. They approached the City of Sidney to take over operation of the library, and

the city council approved their request, appointing a library board that included a member of the Woman's Club. As the library grew, it changed locations multiple times, first moving to the Richland Bank Annex and later to other larger spaces. Faced with a budget crunch in the mid-twentieth century, the Woman's Club again proved instrumental by helping to transform the library into its current form as a city-county library.

The Sidney Woman's Club remained active in the community until disbanding in 1989. Find out more about the club at the MonDak Heritage Center (MDHC). MDHC houses many Sidney Woman's Club Records in its archives, including scrapbooks, minutes and reports, and even the gavel used at monthly meetings.




Plans are also in place to continue to organize the MonDak's expansive collections. MDHC is finalizing details to work with Richland County Communities in Action to hire an AmeriCorps worker for the summer to document and catalog artifacts and records and make them accessible to the public. Plus, Leann Pelvit continues to digitize MDHC's photograph collection. Just in April, she digitized over 100 photographs in between welcoming visitors and helping with programs. With more items in our electronic database, staff and volunteers can better update exhibits and find materials for researchers.

We just finished one of those exhibit updates and others are nearly complete. Head to the lower level of the museum to see our new display on theaters in Sidney and Fairview, as well as the Campaign Office display featuring visuals and audio by Donald Nutter that should be complete by the end of May. Other updates to the MonDak "Main Street" exhibit and some outdoor displays on the north side of the building are also on the horizon and part of long range plans set in place by staff and the MDHC board of directors.

I appreciate all of the investment in the MonDak from you, our members and visitors, during my time here. More importantly, the community appreciates it. Your member support and the time and talents you donate to MDHC make the museum a true gem for Sidney and the surrounding region. Keep up the great work. Cheers!

Sidney Vietnam Veterans Memorial Sculpture Unveiling Saturday, May 25 at 2:00 p.m.

News Briefs

CONGRATULATIONS!

DID YOU KNOW...?

On April 12, 1933, Sidney residents consumed nearly 50 cases of Blatz beer in just a few hours at Olson's Billiard Parlors. The beer arrived in Sidney from Glendive after President Franklin Roosevelt signed an amendment to the Volstead Act (the National Prohibition Act) allowing for the sale of certain kinds of alcohol, such as three-two beer. Under the headline "Truckload of Beer Received Here Wednesday Quickly Consumed," *The Sidney Herald* noted that the beer reached Sidney at 8:00 p.m., and only six cases were left by the morning. The newspaper also pointed out that "a crowd was on hand to see that it was well received" and "opinions as to its quality, as compared with the pre-Volstead beer, varied." The novelty of the beer likely did not last long. Roosevelt announced the repeal of prohibition on December 5, 1933, after the passage and ratification of the 21st amendment.
